3. Exhibitors must exhibit their specimen in clean, clear bottles in proportion with specimen furnished by the exhibitor. Cotton or boxwood should be used to support the stem.
4. No artificial flowers or foliage may be used.
5. The Fair Association is not responsible for loss of accessories, containers, or plants.
6. ALL Horticulture will be taken in from 11:00am to 1:00pm on the Saturday before the Fair, with judging beginning at 2:00pm.
7. An exhibitor may have one entry in a class and subclass. (Example - If you have DAHLIAS you may enter one in 1. Specimen (more than 6 inches ...) and one in 2. Specimen (less than 6 inches.)
8. All specimens must be labeled prior to entering.
9. Entries must remain on exhibit until 10:00pm. Fair Saturday, and must be removed by exhibitor.
